

## TOTAL ORGANIC CARBON, ROUTINE MAJOR

The CITY OF Marshall, has violated the monitoring and reporting requirements set by Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) in Title 30, Texas Administrative Code (30 TAC), Section 290, Subchapter F. Public water systems that use a series of treatment processes that includes coagulation, flocculation, sedimentation or clarification, and filtration as part of the overall treatment protocol must monitor Total Organic Carbon and report the results of that monitoring to the TCEQ on a monthly basis. We failed to monitor and/or report the following constituents Total Organic Carbon\_ This/These violation(s) occurred in the monitoring period(s) April 2020

Results of monitoring are an indicator of whether drinking water is protected from potential adverse health effects associated with disinfectants and disinfection by-products. We did not complete all monitoring and/ or reporting for disinfectant by-product precursors, and therefore TCEQ cannot be sure of the Total Organic Carbon levels in your drinking water during that time.

The City of Marshall is taking the following actions to address this issue:

Resume regular sampling
